

Dawgs' inspirational season one for history books

2014-15 team one of only 6 to make state

MURFRESBORO-The 2014-15 Clay County Bulldog basketball team put themselves among elite company by making the state tournament for only the sixth time in school history and along the way they picked up a huge following as black and gold fans flocked to see what the team would do next.

What was even more impressive about the feat was just a year before they took to the Middle Tennessee State Murphy Center floor here earlier this month, they suffered through a .500 season that came to an abrupt end in the District 7-A play-in game.


"After the season last year I posted our stats alongside a couple of the other state tournament teams' stat-sheets in the locker room and highlighted some of the things it would take to get to that level," head coach Rob Edwards said. "I didn't know if they would even look at it, but apparently they did.

"What they accomplished this year is just a testament to this team's work ethic and character. They were determined to get better and it paid off."

Though a Knoxville Grace Christian heartbreaking buzzer-beater closed the books on the Bulldogs' campaign in the Class A State Tournament opener, the team's overall success well outweighs the final fleeting moment of disappointment.

disappointment. "If you were to tell me at the beginning of each year I could have a team achieve what this one has, I would take it every time," Edwards said, "and there's a hundred more coaches out there who would say the same thing, because when you add it all up there's not many teams that have gotten to this level."

The math is easy. Add a 25-plus win season, a top-five AP poll ranking, an undefeated District 7-A mark, a conference championship, a Region 4-A championship, and a monster home sectional victory all to the rare State Tournament appearance—it more than equals major success.

Regular season

The Dawgs' set the stage for their deep postseason run early with an undefeated 10-0 regularseason start and the fan frenzy began with the year's opening tip. Sophomore sensation Seth Ogletree - 11 Austin Hensley - 14 Josh Endicott - 21 Taylor Brown - 22 Tyreke Key - 23 Justin Boles - 24

Tyreke Key slammed home a John Wayne Browning alley-oop pass with authority on the first play of Clay County's season setting the tone for what was to come.

Key went on to lead the team in scoring, assists,

to play a lot of players—all at a fast pace.

"It was fun to watch." Highlights of the first half of the season included a big win over Goodpasture over the Thanksgiving holiday and a pair of early District 7-A victories against Clarkrange and Monterey.

Then came the team's first setbacks.

A tough road trip to Class AA Macon County resulted in a 57-50 defeat followed by dropping two of three at the highlycompetitive Monticello

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"Those three came against a high level of competition," Edwards said. "We found out we could play with good teams like that and it showed us how good we could be."

After regaining their footing by knocking off Pickett County in Byrdstown, Clay County had another eye-opening stumble that Edwards described as possibly"the most important game of the year."

The Dawgs fell by two points to Red Boiling Springs on their home court—which served as their last loss of the regular

"We knew it was a game we should've won," he said, "but it made us refocus and, looking back, it was probably the best thing that could've happened."

Clay County followed the loss to their neighboring-county rival with another 10-0 win-streak to close out the schedule, while climbing to number four in the statewide Associated Press poll with a 22-4 regular season record.

Along the way they compiled an 8-0 undefeated conference mark which is an accomplishment in itself.

"In my time I only know of two other teams that have done that," Edwards said of the unblemished conference mark. "We did it a few years back and Pickett did once that I know of.

"It's a pretty big task to pull off and something they should be proud of for sure."

To ensure they remained unbeaten in conference play, seniors Latrone Bowman and Taylor Brown made big plays to help their team notch an overtime win over Clarkrange in their final district game.

"Latrone had a big steal and Taylor knocked down free throws to win the game," Edwards said. "Without that, we don't go 8-0."

Key was named the District 7-A MVP and six-foot eight-inch classmate Josh Endicott got the Defensive Player of the Year nod at the end of the regular season while senior John Tanner Dodson and junior Wyatt Mabry were named to the all-conference team. Clay County honorable mentions included



Brown, along with juniors Browning, Justin Boles, Clay Copass, and Matt Mayfield—while Seth Ogltree made the all-freshman team.

"All of those guys deserved the recognition, because they improved greatly from last year," Edwards said. "That, plus the huge addition of Josh, got us where we needed to be heading into the postseason."

District tourney

The conference season-sweep handed the Dawgs the District 7-A Tournament #1 seed and guaranteed them a region berth, but the coach said his team wanted to make a statement with their first postseason win and they did.

"I was concerned going in," Edwards said of their conference-tourney opener versus Pickett County. "This team had never seen success in the postseason, but they didn't show it."

The Dawgs, behind a game-high 25 point MVP performance from Key, flexed their muscles with a 77-55 blowout of Pickett County in which Dodson (12) and Mabry (11) also reached double-digits.

After the 7-A showdown was postponed multiple times, Clay County eventually claimed the conference title by default when the tournament was cancelled due to the massive winter storm of 2015.

Key was named the event's most valuable player, while Endicott, Mabry, Dodson, and Brown joined him on the all-tournament team.

Region tourney

The 7-A championship seeded the Dawgs at the top of the Region

4-A Tournament alongside Goodpasture from District 8-A—a team they were destined to clash with for the title.

It also allowed them to host their first-round game in Celina in front of their hungry Dawg Pound fans—who were again treated to a show.

Key kicked off his 27-point performance with another rim-shaking twohanded slam leading a balanced attack in the 76-58 dismantling of Watertown.

Mabry topped the rest with 16 points, Dodson had a dozen, Endicott scored 10, and Boles added nine in the convincing win that led to a semifinal match-up with conference foe Clarkrange at Watertown High School. That game turned out to be a battle, but the Dawgs again prevailed knocking off the Buffaloes 50-41 to advance to the championship. Key was limited in the contest as Clarkrange held him below the doubledigit mark (9), but Mabry and Endicott carried them through with their inside

game.

Both big guys recorded double-doubles as they dominated the paint. Mabry scored a game-high 18 points to go along with his 10 rebounds, while Endicott dropped in 10 points and pulled down 12 boards in the nine-point victory securing the team a sectional berth, but they weren't satisfied with just getting a shot at the State Tournament—they wanted to play at home.

In order to accomplish that, they had to down the heralded Goodpasture Chirstian private school—a task the team took to heart. After four back-andforth epic quarters, Key calmly sank a pair from the charity stripe with under 10 seconds left in regulation to send the game into overtime where they gutted out the thrilling victory. After traded baskets, Clay County held the ball for the last shot with the game tied at 55. That's when Dodson



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made his mark. Key drove the lane and kicked it to the sharp-shooter who unleashed a bomb with time expiring.

Dodson nailed the biggest shot of his career to set up the team's shot at the Elite 8 on their home court and his game-high 20-point performance was rewarded with the Region 4-A MVP.

Key—who was two rebounds shy of a tripledouble in the game (17 pts/10 ast/8 rbs), Mabry, and Endicott joined Dodson on the all-tournament team.

"To win games like that you have to do all the small things right, you have to get a rebound when you need it, get a steal, make a big shot and these guys did that all year," Edwards said. "It's what I call grit, and this team had it."

Sectional round

That characteristic set the team up in a venue Edwards described as "like no other existing in high school sports"—a home sectional game.

"The atmosphere was unreal," he said. "That's the most people ever to see a game here.

"It was special and we'll never forget it."

The capacity crowd also took away their share of memories as the Dawgs put on a show for their fans and came away with the 55-47 win over Chattanooga Arts and Sciences to secure their State Tournament appearance.

Dodson got things going early with a threepointer, before reserves Browning and Boles came off the bench with treys of their own to fire up the crowd.

Browning-whose pired play came in honor of his father Stacey who had passed away the day before—then made a steal and outletted it to Key to further excite the base when he threw down another dunk before going on to put up a game-high 21-point performance. Mabry and Endicott then got their games going inside en route to 11 and 10 points respectively to finish off CSAS and advance their team on to Murfreesboro.

There they would face Grace Christian and come a lucky bounce away from the final four, but it wasn't to be.

a huge game with a double-double—turned back their first attempt, GCA rattled in a buzzerbeater to end the Dawgs' season at 27-5.

He finished with a team-leading 12 points to

go along with 10 rebounds, while Key had 11, Dodson 10, Endicott nine, and Boles eight in the 54-52 loss.

For black and gold fans and players, it was a heartbreaking way to end the historic see-saw battle and close out the Bulldogs' year, but the journey getting there is not one of total disappointment. "Obviously we're disappointed, but what this team has achieved is quite an accomplishment when you look at the big picture," Edwards said. "There's been somewhere around 90 seasons of basketball played here in this county and they were one of six teams that made it that far—that's quite an achievement. "I hate it for our seniors, but the rest of the guys want to be back here next year and this just gives them the motivation to work harder to accomplish that."

Brown, Dodson, and Bowman saw their careers come to an close with the loss and Edwards said all three of them would be a big loss for the team. "We're losing a big part of this team, but we're not looking to go backwards," he said. "If we continue to improve and work hard, maybe we can get three points better next year."


